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

### May the light be with you

Give your garden instant glamour and romance with Andy Sturgeon's guide to easy, alternative lighting

t may be horticultural heresy to say it but, in the garden, lighting has become almost as important as plants. However, wiring up your garden with electricity and complying with recently introduced legislation means you have to dig pretty deep into your pockets. Luckily, there are some less expensive alternatives, which in some cases even offer better results.

Candles are obviously the oldest light source there is and garden flares were the first readily available garden candle - 2ft long coloured wands that poured molten wax all over your lawn and plants. Thankfully, there are now better options. **Tea lights** are unbelievably cheap to buy in bulk bags, and there are more holders to choose from than you would think possible.


However, despite there being nothing more romantic, the time it takes to light individual candles could be something of a passion killer, and the wind is your enemy. **Oil lamps** could be the solution. There are those on a bamboo stick that you shove into the ground among the planting or more decorative, almost medieval looking, copper and brass torches that can even be wall mounted. Citronella keeps the mossies away but does create black smoke, so beware.

Of course, there is still the hassle factor and we are by nature lazy creatures, so the **gas versions** can be a better option, each one housing a compact butane cylinder with electronic ignition. You can put them round the garden and light them in minutes. It doesn't get much easier, but it does get more stylish.

Outdoor firetables are made from stone with a central burner filled with an alcohol based gel fuel. There is no mess, no fuss and no fumes, and apart from the beautiful flickering light this is a proper piece of furniture which will take your patio or balcony into the style überleague. For a more compact solution along the same lines, patio gel burners give a similarly clean and modern effect.

But electricity need not be difficult. Technological advances in tiny LEDs have given us discreet, **low voltage lights** for patios, steps and decking. Mains powered, they are easily installed, with help from a qualified electrician, for a permanent solution. Or try solar powered brick lights that you slot straight into your paving, glowing spheres that float on your pond and - for the more adventurous - *Star Wars* style **battery powered light sabres**.

For a temporary solution there are always lights that can be plugged into outdoor sockets or extension leads protected by circuit breakers. White fairy lights weaving through the branches of a tree and rope lights snaking around the trunk create a magical effect and they often have numerous pulsing, flashing and dimming functions; just what you need for instant atmosphere.
